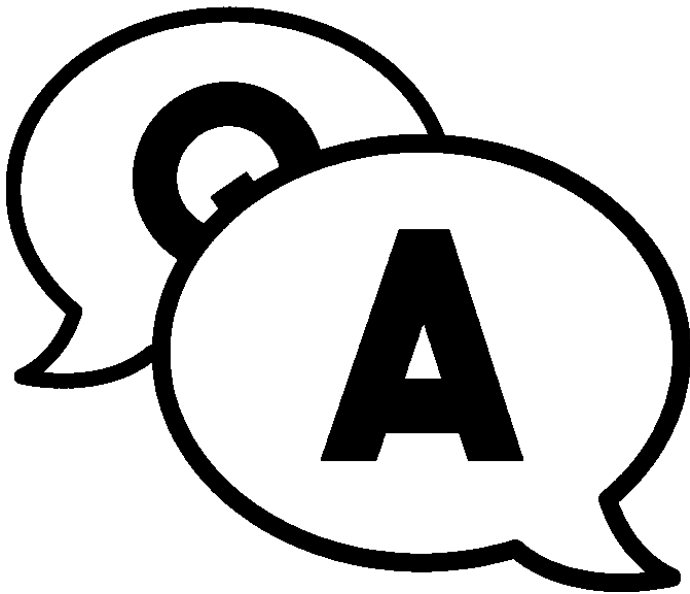
Major Spotlight of the Month: Economics

Economics majors are curious and critical observers who examine the cause and effect of decisions made by individuals and groups. Economists look at incremental steps that add up to a giant leap. Microeconomic, macroeconomic and data analytics courses will build foundational knowledge. You'll take advanced courses in game theory, behavioral economics, and international trade. Many graduates pursue advanced degrees, while others work as analysts at consulting firms, investment banks or government agencies.

As a student athlete, what skills do you feel are transferrable from classroom to the court or court to classroom?

A skill that transfers well from the court to the classroom is competitiveness. It is not so much about wanting to beat others in the classroom, but having the drive to do well and prepare so that I can win for myself. Putting in the work before the big game so that I can perform well on the day that it matters is a very important skill. This can also translate well into the workforce after I graduate.



Favorite class so far?

My favorite class would either be MGMT 310 or MGMT 306. I enjoyed 310 because I like math and it was a very introductory level class of corporate finance. The math was straightforward and not confusing to me, so I really enjoyed it. 306 was interesting to see how excel can be used to solve real world problems, and Professor Alexander made the class engaging no matter what the topic.



How do you juggle the commitments of being an athlete along with the Krannert curriculum? What does your typical schedule look like?

A lot of it is just time management. Once we get in season, I fly to a different state about once a week. So, I try and get my homework and assignments done early so that I do not have to worry about it when we play. If we have a game the night before an exam, I know I will not be able to study that much during the day or after the game, so getting things done early is important.

My schedule is obviously much busier during the season. My typical day starts around 8:00, then I go to a couple of classes before noon and head to Mackey a little after that. I will get a lift in for about an hour, then do rehab for my knee since I tore my ACL in November.

After rehab we start practice around 2:30 and go until 5:30 early in the season, but that gets cut down once we near the end. I eventually get out of Mackey around 6 and then will sometimes head to a library on campus to get some homework done or study for upcoming exams.

If you have submitted your CRF by the deadline, you will receive your Fall 2023 schedule on April 21st. Beginning April 24th, you can begin to edit your schedule.

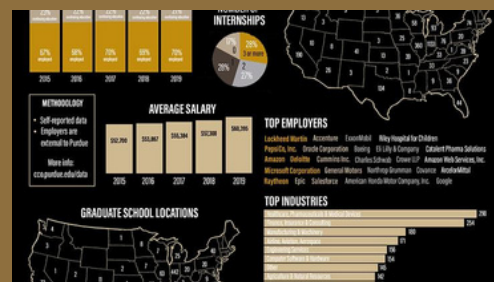

Disability Resource Center

As part of Disability Awareness Month in March, Purdue's Disability Resource Center (DRC) aims to start an interactive conversation about campus accessibility.

The DRC is currently accepting submissions for its Photo Voice Project, a social media photography campaign to promote disability awareness. Purdue community members are encouraged to take pictures of campus environments to highlight accessible and inaccessible spaces and share them using the hashtag #BoilerVoice. As there are many different kinds of disabilities, there are also diverse reasons why a space may be considered particularly accessible or inaccessible. For example, people with mobility issues might find non-electronic doors inaccessible, while people with learning or sensory disabilities might have difficulty with certain print fonts and spaces that are noisy or crowded. Examples of more accessible environments might include classrooms with wheelchair-accessible desks, videos with closed captions, course materials in large, legible print, and quiet or peaceful spaces.

There will be an opening reception in the EIR Lounge on Wednesday March 22 from 9:30am through 11:30am. All are welcome to come observe the display and learn more about the Disability Resource Center, as well as accessibility-minded student organizations.

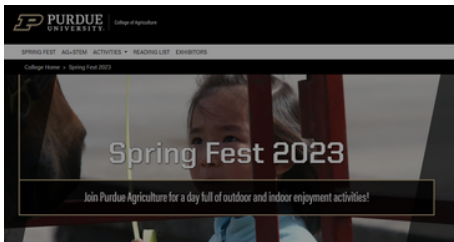

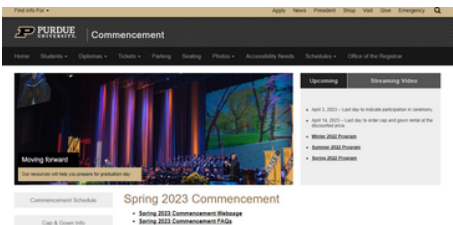
